



## APRIL "BACK TO BASICS": WHAT MAKES IT MODERN?

Professional quilt-makers and husband and wife team, Weeks Ringle and Bill Kerr, will be joining us via Zoom from their design studio in Oak Park, Illinois. They will be discussing "What Makes it Modern?" where design and quilts are concerned.

Weeks and Bill are pioneers of the Modern Quilt Movement, having written the first book on Modern Quilting. Weeks made her first modern quilt in 1987 to rethink the possibilities of the American quilt as being expressive of the time in which we live. Bill began sewing at age 8 and started designing and making modern quilts in 1995.

Their lecture, "What Makes It Modern?", is presented in two parts. Guild members will have access to a pre-recorded YouTube video starting on March 30<sup>th</sup>. Weeks and Bill ask that all members view the pre-recorded video prior to their live Zoom session with us on April 6<sup>th</sup>. During the live Zoom session, Weeks and Bill will answer members' questions and explain concepts introduced in the pre-recorded lecture as needed.

To accommodate the pre-recorded session, the guild will host a viewing party starting at 5:45 pm on Thursday, April 6<sup>th</sup>, just before the April meeting. Also, a link to the pre-recorded YouTube video will be sent out a week before the guild meeting. Members may choose to watch the YouTube video at their leisure, or join other guild members on the 6<sup>th</sup> to watch the video together. **There will be snacks!!! Did someone say snacks?**

**Secretary's Report:** Sharon Perry moved to accept December 1<sup>st</sup> report; Marion Seasholtz seconded. Motion passed.

**Treasurers Report:** Sharon Perry moved to approve the treasurer's reports printed in the January, February, and March newsletters since our last meeting was in December 2022; Marion Seasholtz seconded. Motion passed.

**Sunshine Cards:** Card sent to Anne Harmon due to recent death of her mother.

**Sunshine Quilts:** Marion Seasholtz reported that 20 quilts have gone to both the Meals on Wheels and Lamoille Home Health. She read thank you cards and says she also gets thank you calls. She drew winners from the guild members who have worked on quilts (1 entry for doing a top, 2 entries for helping on a workshop day and additional over the 1 if you use your own fabric or do more than just the top) – Martha Corey for her 75 entries received a special gift. Grace Sweet and Elaine Foster were also winners.

**Sunshine Quilt Workshop:** Next Sunshine quilt workshop will be April 15th from 9 to 3 at Sterling View. Bring your own lunch, Marion will provide dessert.

**Block of the Month:** Bonnie Griswold won the January and March blocks. Linda McGraw won the February blocks. The block pattern for April is Padre Island Star – color theme is scrappy.

**Old Business:** Quilt show – Carol emailed the Noyes House but did not get a reply. Robin Wheel will investigate a contact person.

### New Business:


- Lake Elmore Association sent a letter requesting a queen-sized quilt for a raffle prize. They will give us a donation to offset the cost of fabric. Sharon Perry is offering a quilt that she is willing to donate that she got from the Barb O'Toole estate. Donna Hamel moved to donate this quilt to them and decline the donation as the quilt is being donated. Marion Seasholtz seconded. Motion passed. UPDATE: Sharon thought all the blocks for the quilt (she was offering to donate from Barb O'Toole's quilting estate, were all already embroidered; they are not. There's not enough time to embroider the blocks and finish it to meet the Lake Elmore Association's needs. Marion is looking at other options.
- 23 in 2023 Challenge: 14 members have signed up to participate. No penalty for not finishing for those who have signed up. Criteria is a FINISHED project – exception is a sunshine quilt top. To meet the challenge, members must have done by December meeting to get into the drawing. As a note, finished projects need to be shown at show and tell during a meeting in 2023.
- Marion needs to buy 3 rolls of batting for the Sunshine Quilts. She did relay that the cost has gone up. Sharon Perry moved to purchase 3 rolls; Lisa Vilord seconded. Motion passed.
- VT Shop Hop is running through the Month of March. More information online.
- Quilt show in St. Albans on April 1<sup>st</sup> & 2<sup>nd</sup>.
- Quilt show in Rutland April 22<sup>nd</sup> & 23<sup>rd</sup>; flyer handed out.

**Sew & Tell:** Eleven members shared their work.

**Program:** This month's program was "Color Theory." Guild members watched a video class featuring Becky Goldsmith of Piece O' Cake. Due to the inclement weather, there was no discussion following the video class.

**PATTERN: PADRE ISLAND STAR**



## FRANKLIN COUNTY QUILT SHOW IS BACK!!!

After a 4-year hiatus, St Albans City Hall, at 100 North Main Street, will once again be flooded with color from the over 120 quilts on display for the Franklin County Quilt Show. The show is sponsored by the Franklin County Quilters Guild.

This event is FREE and open to the public; City Hall is an accessible facility. On Saturday the quilt show hours are 9:00 am to 4:00 pm while on Sunday the doors will open at 10:00 am until 3:00 pm.

### QUILT TIPS

- Use binder clips from an office supply store to hold quilt bindings as they're sewn on.
- Use the hair clips which snap closed for holding binding in place instead of pins. They're cheapest at the dollar store.
- When finishing binding corners, you can use a pair of hemostats to pinch the corner just so and hold it in place while stitching.
- Take a plastic coffee stirring stick, and insert a little piece of pipe cleaner shaped into a loop. It is great for cleaning lint out of your sewing machine.
- Use leftover cotton batting for removing nail polish instead of cotton balls. It works great.
- Use bath handles with suction cups from the hardware store to hold your quilt rulers in place while cutting. They are much cheaper than the quilter's version and are just as effective.

- Use bed risers under your cutting table and sewing table legs to raise them to a comfortable height.
- Use a Glad Press 'N Seal empty box to store and tear your stabilizers or fusibles...no more cutting with scissors and always a straight cut.
- Use telescoping magnet on a stick from the automotive store is to pick up pins on the floor.
- An acrylic makeup organizer with many compartments can sit directly to the right of your sewing machine to hold things you might need as you're sewing, such as tweezers, seam rippers, chopsticks, and other gadgets.
- Foam pedicure toe separators make great holders for bobbin storage.
- Use small elastic pony tail holders over bobbins to keep the thread from unraveling.
- Use a Pampered Chef's rotating utensil holder on your sewing table to hold cutters, small rulers, pencils, etc.
- Chocolate is a quilting notion!

## Recipe Corner

### LEMON LAYER CAKE

1 cup butter, softened  
 1½ cups sugar  
 2 large eggs, room temperature  
 3 large egg yolks, room temperature  
 1 tablespoon grated lemon zest  
 2 tablespoons lemon juice  
 ¾ cup sour cream  
 ¼ cup 2% milk  
 2½ cups all-purpose flour  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1 teaspoon baking powder  
 ½ teaspoon baking soda

#### Syrup:

½ cup sugar  
 ½ cup lemon juice

#### Frosting:

2 packages (8 ounces each) cream cheese, softened  
 1 cup butter, softened  
 4 cups confectioners' sugar  
 1½ teaspoons lemon juice  
 ⅛ teaspoon salt

Optional: Lemon slices or edible flowers

Preheat oven to 350°. Line bottoms of 2 greased 9-in. round baking pans with parchment; grease parchment.

Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy, 5-7 minutes. Add eggs and egg yolks, 1 at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat in lemon zest and juice.

In a small bowl, mix sour cream and milk. In another bowl, whisk together flour, salt, baking powder and baking soda; add to creamed mixture alternately with sour cream mixture.

Transfer to prepared pans. Bake until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean, 24-28 minutes. Cool in pans 10 minutes before removing to wire racks; remove parchment. Cool slightly.

For syrup, in a small saucepan, combine sugar and lemon juice. Bring to a boil; cook until liquid is reduced by half. Cool completely.

For frosting, beat cream cheese and butter until smooth; beat in confectioners' sugar, lemon juice and salt until blended.

Using a long serrated knife, cut each cake horizontally in half. Brush layers with warm syrup; cool completely.

Place 1 cake layer on a serving plate; spread with 1 cup frosting. Repeat layers twice. Top with remaining cake layer. Frost top and sides with remaining

frosting. If desired, top with lemon slices or edible flowers. Refrigerate leftovers.

### LEMON SUPREME PIE

Dough for single-crust deep-dish pie

#### Lemon Filling:

1¼ cups sugar, divided  
 6 tablespoons cornstarch  
 ½ teaspoon salt  
 1¼ cups water  
 2 tablespoons butter  
 2 teaspoons grated lemon zest  
 4 to 5 drops yellow food coloring, optional  
 ½ cup lemon juice

#### Cream Cheese Filling:

11 ounces cream cheese, softened  
 ¾ cup confectioners' sugar  
 1½ cups whipped topping  
 1 tablespoon lemon juice

On a lightly floured surface, roll dough to a 1/8-in.-thick circle; transfer to a 9-in. deep-dish pie plate. Trim to 1/2 in. beyond rim of plate; flute edge. Refrigerate 30 minutes. Preheat oven to 425°.

Line crust with a double thickness of foil. Fill with pie weights, dried beans or uncooked rice. Bake on a lower oven rack until edge is golden brown, 20-25 minutes. Remove foil and weights; bake until bottom is golden brown, 3-6 minutes longer. Cool on a wire rack.

For lemon filling, combine ¾ cup sugar, cornstarch and salt in a small saucepan. Stir in water until smooth. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat. Reduce heat; add remaining sugar. Cook and stir until thickened and bubbly, about 2 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in butter, lemon zest and, if desired, food coloring. Gently stir in lemon juice. Cool to room temperature, about 1 hour.

For cream cheese filling, beat cream cheese and confectioners' sugar until smooth. Fold in whipped topping and lemon juice. Spread over pie shell.

Cover cream cheese filling with lemon filling. Refrigerate pie overnight.

If desired, dollop additional whipped topping over lemon filling. Refrigerate until serving.


