QUILT TIPS

- Keep a roll of duct tape handy. Just roll a piece sticky side up around 4 fingers. Great to get all threads when you have to tear out stitches or remove pet hair.

- Use sewing pins for hanging lightweight pictures. Just clip the thin point off. They work great for quilted wall-hangings because you can insert the pins in each top corner and just push them into the drywall (but not plaster!). The tiny holes are not noticeable in the wall.

- When you see a pattern you like, print it out along with the instructions. Place it in a clear 8.5 x 11 plastic sleeve so that it stays nice and clean. You can place it in a hard-bound notebook like the ones used in school.

Recipe Corner

FRENCH APPLE CAKE

1 cup all-purpose flour, spooned into cup & leveled-off 1 teaspoon baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt 1 stick (1/4 cup) unsalted butter, at room temperature

- 1 stick (½ cup) unsalted butter, at room temperature
- ²/₃ cup granulated sugar
- $2 \ {\rm large \ eggs}$
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 3 tablespoons dark rum

2 baking apples, peeled, cored and cut into $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch cubes (such as Honeycrisp, Fuji or Granny Smith) ($3\frac{1}{2}$ - 4 cups chopped)

Confectioners' sugar (optional), for decorating cake

Preheat the oven to 350°F and set an oven rack in the middle position. Grease a 9-inch spring-form or regular cake pan with butter or nonstick cooking spray. If using a regular cake pan, line the bottom of the pan with parchment paper and grease again.

In a small bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder and salt.

Using a handheld mixer with beaters or a stand mixer with the paddle attachment, cream the butter and granulated sugar until light and fluffy, about 3 minutes. Add the eggs, one at a time, beating well and scraping down the sides of the bowl after each addition. Beat in the vanilla and rum. Add the flour mixture and mix on low speed until just combined. Using a rubber spatula, fold in the chopped apples.

Scrape the batter into the prepared pan and even the top. Sprinkle evenly with 1 tablespoon of granulated sugar. Bake for about 40 minutes, or until the cake is golden and a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean. Allow the cake to cool on a rack in the pan.

Once cool, run a blunt knife around the edges of the cake. If using a springform pan, remove the sides. If using a regular cake pan, carefully invert the cake onto the rack, remove the parchment paper, then gently flip the cake over and place right-side-up on a platter. Using a fine sieve, dust with confectioners' sugar (if using). Cake can be served warm or room temperature, plain or with lightly sweetened whipped cream or vanilla ice cream.

Freezer Friendly Instructions: The cake can be frozen for up to 3 months. After it is completely cooled, wrap it tightly with aluminum foil or freezer wrap. Thaw overnight on the countertop before serving.

APPLE CARAMEL CHEESECAKE BARS

2 cups all-purpose flour ¹/₂ cup packed brown sugar ³⁄₄ cup cold butter, cubed 2 packages (8 ounces each) cream cheese, softened 1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons sugar, divided 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 2 large eggs, lightly beaten 3 medium tart apples, peeled and finely chopped ¹/₂ teaspoon ground cinnamon ¹/₄ teaspoon ground nutmeg Streusel: ³⁄₄ cup all-purpose flour ³⁄₄ cup packed brown sugar 1/2 cup quick-cooking oats 1/3 cup cold butter, cubed ¹/₃ cup hot caramel ice cream topping

Preheat oven to 350°. In a small bowl, combine flour and brown sugar; cut in butter until crumbly. Press into a well-greased 13x9-in. baking pan. Bake 15-18 minutes or until lightly browned.

Meanwhile, in a large bowl, beat cream cheese, 1/2 cup sugar and vanilla until smooth. Add eggs; beat on low speed just until combined. Spread over crust.

In a small bowl, toss apples with cinnamon, nutmeg and remaining sugar; spoon over cream cheese layer. In another bowl, mix flour, brown sugar and oats; cut in butter until crumbly. Sprinkle over apple layer.

Bake 25-30 minutes or until filling is set. Drizzle with caramel topping; cool in pan on a wire rack 1 hour. Refrigerate at least 2 hours. Cut into bars.
