# **Recipe Corner**

#### PEACH BLUEBERRY PIE

#### 1 cup sugar

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup all-purpose flour
<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> teaspoon ground cinnamon
<sup>1</sup>/<sub>8</sub> teaspoon ground allspice
3 cups sliced peeled fresh peaches
1 cup fresh or frozen unsweetened blueberries
Dough for double-crust pie
1 tablespoon butter
1 tablespoon 2% milk

Cinnamon sugar

In a large bowl, combine sugar, flour, cinnamon and allspice. Add peaches and blueberries; toss to coat.

Preheat oven to 400°. On a lightly floured surface, roll half of dough to a 1/8-in.-thick circle; transfer to a 9-in. pie plate. Trim even with rim. Add filling; dot with butter.

Roll remaining dough to a 1/8-in.-thick circle; cut into 1/2-in.-wide strips. Arrange over filling in a lattice pattern. Trim and seal strips to edge of bottom crust; flute edge. Brush lattice strips with milk; sprinkle with cinnamon sugar.

Bake until crust is golden brown and filling is bubbly, 40-45 minutes. Cool on a wire rack.

Recipe Note: Frozen fruit may be used if it is thawed and well drained.

#### FIZZY PEACH SHAKE

3 medium peaches, pitted

 $1/3\ {\rm cup}\ {\rm ginger}$  ale, chilled, plus additional for topping if desired

2 tablespoons honey

1 quart vanilla ice cream

Optional: Whipped cream and peach slices

Place peaches, ginger ale and honey in a blender; cover and process until smooth. Add ice cream; cover and process until combined. Pour into serving glasses. If desired, top with whipped cream or additional ginger ale and garnish with peach slices. Serve immediately.

#### **CONTEST-WINNING PEACH COBBLER**

2 cans (29 ounces each) sliced peaches
½ cup packed brown sugar
6 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon, optional
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
<u>Topping</u>:
1 cup all-purpose flour
1 cup sugar

1 teaspoon baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
¼ cup cold butter, cubed
2 large eggs, room temperature, lightly beaten
<u>Butterscotch sauce</u>:
½ cup packed brown sugar
2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
½ teaspoon salt
¼ cup butter, melted
2 tablespoons lemon juice
Vanilla ice cream, optional

Drain peaches, reserving 1/2 cup syrup for the sauce. In a large bowl, combine peaches, brown sugar, tapioca, cinnamon if desired, lemon juice and vanilla. Transfer to an ungreased 11x7-in. baking dish. Let stand for 15 minutes.

In a large bowl, combine the flour, sugar, baking powder and salt; cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in eggs. Drop by spoonfuls onto peach mixture; spread evenly. Bake at 350° until filling is bubbly and a toothpick inserted in topping comes out clean, 50-55 minutes. Cool for 10 minutes.

For butterscotch sauce, in a small saucepan, combine the brown sugar, flour, salt, butter and reserved peach syrup. Bring to a boil over medium heat; cook and stir until thickened, 1 minute. Remove from the heat; add lemon juice. Serve cobbler with warm sauce and, if desired, ice cream.

#### **BERRY-CHERRY PEACH SAUCE**

2 cups fresh or frozen sliced peeled peaches <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup fresh or frozen blueberries 6 fresh or frozen pitted dark sweet cherries, halved 1 cup plus 1 tablespoon orange juice, divided <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup sugar 1 tablespoon cornstarch Vanilla ice cream

In a large saucepan, combine the peaches, blueberries, cherries, 1 cup orange juice and sugar; cook and stir over low heat until sugar is dissolved. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, for 7 minutes or until peaches are tender.

Combine cornstarch and remaining orange juice until smooth; stir into hot fruit mixture. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened. Remove from the heat. Serve with ice cream.

### QUILT TIPS

- Make your binding when you finish your quilt. Then you won't accidentally use the fabric for another project before the quilt gets finished.
- Make your outside border about 1/2" larger than you really want it. Doing so will give you room to square up the quilt after it is quilted.
- Use a different colored thread in the bobbin. To rip out, clip every 3<sup>rd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> top thread and the bobbin thread will pull out easily.

- If one of the two pieces (blocks or top and border) is SLIGHTLY larger, put the larger one on the bottom when sewing, pin liberally, and the feed dogs will ease them to fit.
- Use two squares (any size) as a "feeder" piece when sewing pieces together. You will be making 4-patch/6-patch/9-patch pieces and actually making two quilts at the same time. It will save on wasted thread, and you will have fewer thread tails to clean up.
- If you start a project and there is a "possibility" you may not finish it right away, jot down some hints to yourself about where you purchased the fabrics, the year, any problems you had and how you fixed them, what step you are on, and anything else you might need to know. It helps to jog your memory when you get back to the project.
- Use a picnic silverware organizer to organize my rotary cutter, scissors and marking pens.
- Chocolate is a quilting notion!
